## Easterseals Wisconsin - Celebrating 95 Years!

As we mark 95 years of providing unique services to children and adults with disabilities across Wisconsin, we'd like to share a few of the significant milestones in what has been an exciting, sometimes challenging, but always incredibly rewarding, journey:

1926, Easterseals Wisconsin (ESW) founded as the Wisconsin Association for the Disabled.

1938: Upham sisters donate 400 acres of land in Wisconsin Dells to ESW for the purpose of creating a camp for children with disabilities. Camp Wawbeek, now the oldest Easterseals camp in the world, is born!

1941: The Homebased Enterprise Program is established in Wisconsin, run by the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR). DVR contracts with ESW to create the Wisconsin Craftsman Program.

1967: Easterseals officially adopted the "Easter Seals" name after the visibility of the Easter "Seals" campaign, implemented in 1934, triggers a nationwide expansion of the organization and a swell of grassroots efforts on behalf of people with disabilities.

1977: Pioneer Camp created for Camp Wawbeek campers who sought a more adventurous camp experience.

1989: ESW Board approves the creation of the Resource Center for Farmers with Disabilities (RCFD).

1990: Nationwide, Easterseals affiliates help in passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

1991: Through US Department of Agriculture funding, ESW's RCFD teams up with the University of Wisconsin Cooperative Extension to form AgrAbility of Wisconsin. 1992: Answering a statewide need for respite care, the Wisconsin Elks and ESW create Respite Camp.

1995: Made possible by the Loretta Ricker Trust, the Disability HelpLine is established in Outagamie County.

1995: Inaugural Golf Outing for Kids held; event has since raised more than \$2 million.

2002: Wisconsin Craftsman stores close as DVR discontinues funding after 61 years.

2002: ESW enters into agreement with DVR to triple services to farmers with disabilities statewide through the FARM Program (formerly RCFD) and provide

ongoing training to DVR staff.

2004: Gregory C. Van Wie Girls Dorm built at Camp Wawbeek.

2005: Self-Employment Services instituted to help entrepreneurs with disabilities find opportunities and greater independence through selfemployment.

2006: New Respite facility built, increasing the number of campers served by 35%.

2006: Camp expands to include people with high-functioning autism.

2009: Veterans Family Camp launched at ESW camps.

2010: FARM Program begins project to train state Vocational Rehabilitation agencies nationwide in providing services to farmers.

**2014:** New Kiwanis swimming pool opens at Camp Wawbeek.

**2015:** FARM Program begins project to help farmers develop succession plans.

2017: ESW adopts new look and logo (which includes merging "Easter" and "Seals" into one word) - the national organization's most significant rebrand in nearly 50 years.

## Bill Holley - In Memorium

A cherished member of the Easterseals Wisconsin (ESW) family was lost in June, with the passing of Bill Holley.

For four decades, Bill demonstrated his commitment to our mission in dozens of ways. He served on the Board of Directors, raised hundreds of thousands of dollars as a volunteer fundraiser, shared our message with his family and colleagues, and encouraged his fellow board members and ESW staff to dream big of ways the agency could better serve people with disabilities. His hard work, vision, and dedication helped to create programs and services that have and will continue to change lives for thousands of children and adults with disabilities every single year in Wisconsin.

In 2014, Easterseals Wisconsin honored Bill with the Lifetime Achievement Award at our Recognition Dinner. ESW board and staff members share their thoughts about Bill, and his impact on them and on ESW in this video, which was shown that evening: https://bit.ly/2XXwnqZ

## Welcome to Our New Staff Members!





Brenda Nelson joined Easterseals Wisconsin this summer as the Camp Billing Specialist. She is responsible for administrative billing operations to support the Camp department, for updating databases and maintaining accurate accounting for all Camp programs, billing responsible parties for camper fees, and maintaining accounts receivable and collections. Brenda is from St. Joseph, Missouri and just moved to Wisconsin in May. Once settled, she will continue her pursuit of a Bachelor's degree

in Elementary Education/Special Education, complementing her desire to work with people with disabilities. She has one son, loves seafood, crocheting and math.

## The Nerenhausen Family

For 23 years, the Nerenhausens searched for answers, trying to find a diagnosis for their daughter Leah's disability. Leah is non-verbal and uses a wheelchair. But none of the appointments with doctors or specialists, the thousands of questions answered and unanswered, the various blood tests and muscle biopsies, have yet given them the answers they seek.

But it spite of no clear diagnosis, the Nerenhausen family are, in their own words, "on an even keel." Things are going pretty well right now," says Leah's mother, Lisa Nerenhausen-Sorensen. "Leah is healthy, so we just keep pressing on."

Before 1998, Lisa had never heard of Easterseals Wisconsin. She and her husband, Brian, had two healthy boys and, until Leah's birth, had no experience caring for a loved one with disabilities. When Leah was three years old, the Nerenhausen family decided they needed some assistance. That's when they first got in touch with Easterseals Wisconsin's Disability HelpLine of Outagamie County. The HelpLine has been an important part of their lives ever since.

Over the years, Lisa has been a member of the Parents-4-Parents (P4P) support group for families caring for a loved one with disabilities. "From the very beginning, our experience with Jill [Gretzinger] was smooth and easy. She's so smart and knew all the organizations to connect us to." Gretzinger, who has since changed her role with the HelpLine to Coordinator of the Guardian Assistance Program, served as the Coordinator of the Outagamie County Disability HelpLine for more than 25 years. She has deep roots in Outagamie County communities and has been the driving force of the HelpLine, which serves hundreds of families in the area each year.

"P4P proved to be a great way to meet other parents caring for children with disabilities. Jill was there to facilitate meetings and has been a great resource for all of us," Lisa shares about the unique program.

Made possible through a trust established by the estate of Loretta K. Ricker, the Disability HelpLine of Outagamie County is located in Appleton, and provides a variety of services to Outagamie County residents with disabilities including:

- Information and referral
- Grants to individuals
- Parents-4-Parents support group
- Guardian Assistance Program
- Community projects

Along with the P4P support group, one of the most helpful projects Easterseals Wisconsin has helped with was the installation of an accessible entryway to accommodate the wheelchair ramp for Leah.

"As Leah has gotten older, so have we," laughs Lisa. "The accessible entryway makes it much easier on all of us."

"Having this community of people in our lives has been such a blessing. We've especially realized how invaluable the HelpLine is over this past year." As Leah moved into adulthood and Lisa and Brian took on the role as her financial guardians, the HelpLine's Guardian Assistance Program has been a tremendous help.

"Learning how to handle her finances and estate has been more involved than we had imagined," says Lisa. "And we're so grateful the HelpLine added this program a few years ago. Jill explained every aspect of the responsibilities of a guardian and walked us through the documents we needed to complete for the county. The Guardian Assistance Program isn't a program that someone would need to use every month, but knowing it's there and someone can help you is such a relief. It's wonderful to know someone is there to look out for you,"

The Nerenhausen family will continue to fight for Leah, in hopes that a diagnosis will finally reveal itself and possibly open up the door to steps that could help her. A clear diagnosis would, for genetic reasons, also be helpful to her brothers.

## **Exploring Job Options in Rural Wisconsin**

Since 2017, Easterseals Wisconsin's FARM Program has been working with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) to provide a unique learning experience for high school students with disabilities. Exploring Job Options in Rural Wisconsin is a course focusing on the many and varied career possibilities available in the Agriculture industry, offering participating students the ability to focus of their areas of interest. The FARM Program continues to partner with Camp Wawbeek, providing the course to Transitions campers four times each year.

This past year, tours of different ag-related businesses were done virtually due to COVID-19 protocols, but as restrictions eased, we were able to conduct an in-person tour to Port Fish, a farm growing vegetables through an aquaponics system. Speakers have also joined in these classes virtually, including a farmer with disabilities, an agronomist, and a vet tech who also does animal therapy and acupuncture. The student who met in person for the course had the opportunity to hear from a Conservation Warden who joined the class in person as a speaker.

The FARM Program is looking forward to joining Camp Wawbeek in a Young Adult/Transitions week-long session later this summer. With the new virtual option for the course, a marketing push was made, and interest has increased from around the state. We are very excited to see where this course will go and to continue conversations with interested individuals. 

#### **USDA Grant**

Easterseals Wisconsin FARM Program's USDA Socially-Disadvantaged Outreach Grant was awarded in 2019 to serve socially-disadvantaged farmers over a three-year period.

The FARM staff continues to partner with UW-Extension with the long-term goal of enhancing the profitability and sustainability of Hmong, veteran, and other socially-disadvantaged farmers in Wisconsin by providing outreach to help them access USDA programs. Agricultural education opportunities continue to be made possible through agricultural exploration classes, safety days, and targeted presentations.

The 2501 Program (also known as the Outreach and Assistance for Socially-Disadvantaged Farmers and Ranchers and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers Program) was created through the 1990 Farm Bill to help farmers, ranchers, and foresters who have historically experienced limited access to USDA loans, grants, training, and technical assistance. The 2014 Farm Bill expanded the program's reach to veterans.
